To travel the far bounds of this Grand Jurisdiction wearing the beautifully adorned Norm Watts Ceremonial Grand Lecturer's apron is a memory I will cherish for the rest of my life. One of the first things I learned after being installed as Grand Lecture was the meaning and the symbolism of the apron and Jewel. The Six Pointed Star represents the Wisdom of Solomon and the Closed Eye All Masonic Knowledge. I have served as Lodge secretary for almost 10 years and I always took the time to write a personal note to the members of the lodge I had not seen in awhile when I sent dues cards each year. Many times they would write back.

The Kitsap county Sheriff is Br, Steve Boyer and he wrote one year that he always thought about the Masonic teachings when he met people who were headed down the wrong way on the road of life. He felt his job was to try to help the person see the better way and change their behavior before it was too late.

A 60 year member of Steadfast Lodge wrote once that he always remembered the lessons he learned at the lodge when he took the degrees of Masonry during World War II. We in the Fraternity have also embraced Change. Several years ago we had TTWWADI Pins. That is the way we have always done it/ not. We changed the way we coached new candidates. The Deputy responded that the lodges were not interested in participating in the program because in its present format there was no way they could win. The point of the competition was to encourage Ritual Proficiency and any one who participated and practiced were the winners. It was a win win situation from the start. I remember one of the first questions asked me as an Entered Apprentice Mason was "What came you here to do?" My answer was "To Learn, To subdue my passions and To improve myself in Masonry." To improve myself in masonry. Not to Win. Not to be perfect. Just to try improve myself. That is what we all are trying to do.

There are men in this room who have a Passion for The Past. There are things we used to do that in the past that worked. We used to teach the ritual to each other mouth to ear and it worked. We used to meet weekly and or daily and go over the parts until we had it down. There is a table and two chairs down in the boiler room of Steadfast Lodge where the candidates were taught masonry man to man, brother to brother. And we learned a lot more than Masonry too. You don't practice until you get it right. You practiced until you could not get it wrong. We don't just give them a book and say go read it and let me know if you have any questions. So how do we do learn the ritual. This is a very big job. Well one of the Past Masters of Steadfast Lodge favorite saying is "Yard by Yard it is hard, Inch my Inch it is a cinch. Try to learn one small part at a time. First you can work on the prayers and Charges. Then you can do a part of the lecture. It would be great if each officer learned the installation part for their office each year. Not only would they learn the ritual but they would also be learning their own job description.

In some cases change does not work. IT causes more problems. We have tried change and have not obtained what we have sought. Maybe it is time for us to retry some of the things that have worked in the past. The Grand Worthy Advisor ask up yesterday "How is your PMA and we had to respond. Now it is time for us to ask how is your EMI. It may be a time for a Passion for the Past. It may be the time for us to go Back to the Future.
